Expected learning outcomes

After completing the course, the student should be able to compose clear and detailed texts on subjects that are within his or her field of interest. The student is able to write reports or essays that supports or opposes a certain position.

The student is able to verbally give a clear and detailed account of the situation within his or her field of interest and experience. The student is also able to explain a position, as well as explain the advantages and disadvantages of different alternatives.

The student is able to read articles and reports that treat current problems and that express attitudes and opinions. The student understands most of the content in newspapers as well as pertinent TV shows and most films where standard language is used. The student is also able to read elementary academic texts and has basic knowledge regarding English academic vocabulary.

The student can converse and discuss so fluently and comfortably that he or she can socialize with native speakers in a relaxed manner.

The student is able to demonstrate clear knowledge about Swedish history.

In order to receive the grade of *Pass with Distinction*, the student must also be able to communicate in English with linguistic certainty.

Content

The course includes exercises in speaking, conversation, writing, reading and listening in English. The student composes texts and gives oral presentations that address relevant subjects and subjects in which the student is interested. The student reads and listens to English texts and makes comments on them. Vocabulary and grammatical exercises are also included.

The course also includes an introduction to Swedish history.

Attendance is mandatory during the parts of the course marked as seminar on the course schedule.

Type of Instruction

The course includes exercises in speaking, conversation, writing, reading and listening in English. The student writes texts and gives oral presentations that address relevant subjects and subjects in which the student is interested. The student reads and listens to English texts and makes comments on them. Vocabulary and grammatical exercises are also included.

The course also includes an introduction to Swedish history.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

Student grades for the course are Fail, Pass or Pass with Distinction.

Examination and grading occurs via continuous assessment of the student's language skills and knowledge.

Course Evaluation

Teaching is continually evaluated throughout the semester.

At the end of the course, a written course evaluation is performed and compiled into a report. The evaluation report is available to students and is filed and stored according to departmental regulations.

Upon request, students who have successfully passed all course requirements may receive a course certificate.
