Prerequisites

Objectives

After completing the course, the student should be able to:

- account for the historical and social context in which Shakespeare's drama and poetry were created,
- distinguish thematic and formal characteristics in the original texts studied,
- relate current critical perspectives on Shakespeare to the views of the 16th and 17th centuries,

In order to receive the grade of *Pass with Distinction*, the student should also demonstrate a very good ability to reflect independently on the course material and produce written assignments demonstrating good language proficiency and clear structure.

Content

In this course the student should develop the ability to relate a number of Shakespeare's texts to the time period during which they were written, and relate that time's views on Shakespeare to changed views in later time periods.

Type of instruction

The course includes a number of seminars and study assignments in which specific works of Shakespeare are discussed in relation to basic historical and critical perspectives on these.

Examination

The course is examined through participation in seminars and written assignments.

Attendance at seminars is compulsory.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

For students who do not pass the first examination, no more than four retake examinations are provided.

Course Evaluation

The teaching is continuously evaluated during the semester.

At the end of the course, a course evaluation is conducted and compiled into a report, which is made available to students and filed according to departmental regulations.
