Objectives

After completing the course, the student should be able to:

- account for, interpret and discuss basic concepts in English linguistics and literary studies,
- conduct basic linguistic analyses,
- conduct basic literary analyses,
- produce written and oral texts in English for different purposes,

Module 1, English language proficiency, 3 credits

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- demonstrate proficiency in spoken and written English, using grammatically correct, varied and idiomatic English adapted to different situations,
- give short oral academic presentations in English, using correct and fluent language.

Essay, 2 credits

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- write short academic texts which are well-structured, grammatically correct and adapted to different contexts,
- use source material and references to secondary literature correctly,
- use vocabulary appropriate for the text.

Oral presentation, 1 credit

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- demonstrate good abilities to prepare and give short, coherent oral presentations without reading too much directly from a manuscript.
- give presentations using correct and fluent language and relevant content adapted to the situation and of high academic quality.

Module 2, Introduction to literature as a research field, 2 credits

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- account for comparative literature as a field of research,
- critically review the aims and methods of literary research texts.

Module 3, Narrative and drama, 5 credits

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- account for basic literary terminology and apply this in analyses of literary texts.
- compare various literary genres and forms,
- critically review the aims and methods of literary research texts,
- reflect on the applicability of various theoretical tools in analyses of specific texts.

Module 4, English linguistics, 5 credits

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- account for, exemplify and in analyses apply basic linguistic concepts,
- conduct basic clause analysis,

Content

The course includes the following modules:

Module 1 English language proficiency 3 credits

This module includes practical oral and written exercises in language proficiency. When it comes to written language proficiency, teaching is delivered in the form of instructions on academic writing. The students write short academic texts (for example argumentative and analytical essays) on which the teacher provides feedback.

In oral language proficiency, the students give short oral presentations using ICT (e.g. video recordings) on which the teacher provides feedback.

Module 2 Introduction to literature as a research field 2 credits

This module includes an introduction to a selection of literary theories. The students learn how to apply literary terminology and account for various literary methods, such as close reading and critical reading. The module includes an introduction to literature as a research field.

Module 3 Narrative and drama 5 credits

This module presents literary tools for analysing various genres in epic poetry and drama. The students explore narrative techniques in English novels, short stories and drama. Narratology and other theoretical perspectives are applied and explored from various approaches focusing on the aspects they highlight in literary texts. The students also explore how literary analyses are influenced by social and cultural contexts.

Module 4 English linguistics 5 credits

This module includes a general introduction to form and function in the English language, and introduces some central themes in linguistics.

Type of Instruction

Teaching is delivered in the form of recorded lectures and teacher-led discussions on the online learning platform. Teaching is delivered in English.

The teaching makes use of ICT tools provided at the university's online learning platform. For detailed technical requirements, see the text about technical requirements on the course website on lnu.se.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

In order to receive the grade of Pass, the student must achieve the objectives.

In order to receive the grade of Pass with Distinction, the student must have received the grade of Pass with Distinction for at least 10 credits, including the Essay. Grading criteria for the grade of Pass with Distinction in each module will be specified when the course starts.

In module 1, *Essay*, 2 credits, is examined through an essay, and *Oral presentation*, 1 credit, through an oral presentation.

Module 2 is examined through written assignments.

Module 3 is examined through written assignments. Module 4 is examined through written assignments.

Since a fundamental objective of the course is for the students to be able to use the English language in a correct, varied and contextually appropriate manner, language proficiency is assessed in all modules.

If the university has decided that a student has the right to special educational support due to a disability, the examiner may offer an adapted test or allow the student to conduct the test in an alternative form.

For students who do not pass their first examinations, retake examinations are provided in accordance with Local regulations for courses and examinations at the first and second levels at Linnaeus University.

Course Evaluation

At the end of the course, a course evaluation is conducted. Results and analysis of the course evaluation are communicated to the students who have taken the course. Students who are taking the course when it is offered the next time are informed of the results at the start of the course. The evaluation is anonymous.
