Prerequisites

Objectives

After completing this course the student should be able to:

- account for the basics of supply chain management (SCM)
- describe and analyse how managing physical flows and information flows streamlines procurement, distribution systems, and the retail supply chain
- apply quantitative models for supply chain analyses

Content

The course contains:

- basic concepts of SCM/purchasing/material supply/distribution/lean
- supply chain management (retail SCM) for efficiency
- sustainability in supply chains
- quantitative analyses; total cost analysis, inventory management and customer service measurement

Type of Instruction

The teaching consists of lectures, calculation exercises, computer labs/workshops/business games, and supervision.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades A, B, C, D, E or F.

The course is examined through an individual written examination 5 credits, group assignment with written assignment/opposition/oral presentation during seminars 2 credits and active participation in computer labs/workshops/business games 0.5 credits.

The grade A constitutes the highest grade on the scale and the remaining grades follow in descending order where the grade E is the lowest grade on the scale that will result in a pass. The grade F means that the student's performance is assessed as fail.

Resit examination is offered in accordance with Linnaeus University's Local regulations for courses and examination at the first- and second-cycle levels.

In the event that a student with a disability is entitled to special study support, the examiner will decide on adapted or alternative examination arrangements.

Course Evaluation
