Prerequisites

Objectives

After completing this course the student should be able to:

- account for basic theory in organizing and management
- account for classic contributions to organization theory and the development of the field
- interpret organizational phenomena by different perspectives
- argue for various courses of action in an organization in relation to theory and practice
- reflect upon ethics and sustainability in a national and an international context

Content

The course contains:

- organization theory classics and the development of the field
- the people, work and motivation of the organization
- formal and informal social structures
- organizational environment and strategy
- politics and power
- culture and symbolism
- leadership as perspective and practice
- change and learning
- gender and diversity in organizations
- identification and formulation of problems, searching for and evaluating information, and structuring of analysis and basis for decision-making

Type of Instruction

Teaching is carried out as distance learning with help from a learning platform and consists of self-studies based on instructions from the course coordinator. The teaching consists of self-studies and web-based discussions. The course requires access to a computer and the internet. No compulsory meetings on campus are included.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades A, B, C, D, E, Fx or F.

The course is examined through a written examination (4,5 credits) and a paper (3 credits).

The grade A constitutes the highest grade on the scale and the remaining grades follow in descending order where the grade E is the lowest grade on the scale that will result in a pass. The grade F means that the student's performance is assessed as fail. Grading criteria for the A–F scale are communicated in writing to the student by the start of the course at the latest, as well as how the weighting and weighting of grades on individual examining elements to the final course grade takes place. The basis for the student's grade is determined by the student's fulfillment of the objectives.

Repeat examination is offered in accordance with Local regulations for courses and examination at the first and second-cycle level at Linnaeus University. An examiner can, in exceptional cases, decide that a student who is close to the level for a passing grade may carry out supplementary assignments in order to reach the passing grade.

If the university has decided that a student is entitled to special pedagogical support due to a disability, the examiner has the right to give a customised exam or to have the student conduct the exam in an alternative way.

Course Evaluation

During the implementation of the course or in close conjunction with the course, a course evaluation is to be carried out. Results and analysis of the course evaluation are to be promptly presented as feedback to the students who have completed the course. Students who participate during the next course instance receive feedback at the start of the course. The course evaluation is to be carried out anonymously.
