Prerequisites

Writing historical novels I, or the equivalent

Expected learning outcomes

After completing the course, students should have acquired:

- understanding for how novelists search for historical knowledge and how the validity of that knowledge should be evaluated in relation to the idea behind the novel,
- knowledge of how written narrative linguistically and contextually correlates with the historical content of the text,
- orientation in theories of narration and the genres of history and history of literature.

A complementary goal for all education within the humanities is that students have the ability to correctly use Swedish in writing.

Content

During the course, students will work on furthering their skills in creating an historical novel or short story. Teaching focuses on linguistic revision of existing texts in relation to theories about genres and narration as well as methods on how historical knowledge can be searched out and used in fictional contexts.

Type of Instruction

The course is offered as a distance course and uses an on-line learning management

system.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U) or Pass (G).

Examination occurs through written assignments and active participation during seminars. Examination is in the form of web-based seminar assignments and written assignments. Examination regarding the expected learning outcome formulated as “have knowledge of” occurs through a final written examination paper, while the other expected learning outcomes are examined through active participation during seminars and other minor written assignments.

Students at Linnaeus University are entitled to have the course grade translated into the 7-step ECTS scale. A request to have the grades translated must be made to the teacher at the start of the course.

Course Evaluation

At the end of the course, a written course evaluation is performed and compiled into a report. The evaluation report is available to students and is filed and stored according to departmental regulations.

Credit Overlap

This course cannot be part of a degree in combination with another course in which the content fully or partly correspond to the content of this course: The course can also be taken as a Comparative Literature course under course code 1LI136.
