#### **Prerequisites**

## Expected learning outcomes

On completion of the course, students should be able to:

- account for the societal functions of nobility in Europe as well as their change in role from warrior caste to dominating bureaucracy, as a result of the statebuilding process,
- account for important features of noble attitudes within different fields such as politics, honour and religion,
- argue for whether nobles were characterised by adaptability or fossilisation in different European countries,
- discuss major differences within nobility and what it meant for noble identity.

#### Content

This course covers the development of the Early Modern State, as well as the societal functions of nobility in Europe, along with their change in role from warrior caste to dominating bureaucracy. An important feature in this is the role of education, and how a new ideal, educated, nobleman emerged. Patron and client relations and duels are also touched upon. Special emphasis is placed on the utilization of source texts so that students themselves can work with empirical material. With this in view, the new edition

of Claes Ekeblad's, the seventeenth century nobleman, letters, as well as a compendium with letters and other primary sources, are included in the course literature.

## Type of Instruction

Teaching in the form of web based lectures. Examination and grading are based on written home assignments and a written project work in accordance with teacher instructions.

#### Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

In order to pass the course, students need to meet the expected learning otucomes.

Examination and grading occur through written assignments in accordance with teacher instructions. Active participation at web based seminar discussions is required in order to pass the course.

A resit is offered within six weeks (within the framework of regular terms) and the number of resits is limited to five (in accordance with the Higher Education Ordinance 6 chap. 21§).

### **Course Evaluation**

Course evaluation is carried out at the end of the course. The evaluation is compiled, reviewed with the students and archived according to departmental protocol.
