The working method applied in the course implies that the student has active participation and critical thinking. The basic pedagogical idea supports sustainable learning, development of independence and responsibility for knowledge development both individually and in groups.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

The course is examined with two examination assignments.

Examination assignment 1- Individual written take-home examination with oral presentation included, 6.5 HE credits. The examination assignment consists of an individual written take-home examination with an oral presentation included. Grades: Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

Examination assignment 2- Individual written assignment with oral presentation included, 1 HE credit. The examination assignment consists of an individual written

assignment with an oral presentation included. Grades: Fail (U) and Pass (G). The final grade of the course is awarded only when both examination assignments have been assessed with the Pass (G) grade. The Pass (G) grade requires this grade for examination assignments 1 and 2.

The Pass with Distinction (VG) grade as the final grade of the course requires this grade is for examination assignment 1 as well as the Pass (G) grade for examination assignment 2. The course grade criteria are provided for each examination assignment and form the basis for grading.

If the university has decided that a student is entitled to special pedagogical support due to a disability, the examiner has the right to give a customised exam or to have the student conduct the exam in an alternative way.

Repeated examination is offered in accordance with Local regulations for courses and examination at the first and second cycle level at Linnaeus University.
