# **Objectives**

After completing the course, the student should be able to:

- plan and conduct a coherent literature project for children and young readers,
- critically analyse their own writing and relate this to various literary contexts.

# **Module 1: The contexts of the literary text (5 credits)**

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- identify central aspects of the relation between literature and literary, biographical and attitudinal contexts, and relate this to their own writing,
- discuss the relation between literature and young readers and the specific requirements for literature written for children and young readers,
- account for and critically analyse the relation between literature and society and relate this to their own writing,
- critically review and relate to various ideas on how literature can be valued and

formulate their own opinions concerning literary value.

# Module 2: Writing 1 (10 credits) and Module 3: Writing 2 (15 credits)

After completing modules 2 and 3, the student should be able to:

- demonstrate an independent, critical and theoretically aware approach to forms of expression in children's and young adult literature in their own writing,
- structure and conduct a major literature project for children and young readers,
- formulate critically aware ideas on language and interpretation and the requirements imposed on the student's own writing for children and young readers concerning this.

#### Content

# **Module 1: The contexts of the literary text (5 credits)**

The social conditions of literature are covered and the relation between text and context is discussed on the basis of perspectives of children's and young adult literature. Questions concerning the author's responsibility concerning young readers, language adjustment and degree of difficulty, as well as the educational role of literature are discussed from gender and multicultural perspectives. The question of quality and literary value is studied in-depth from perspectives of children's and young adult literature.

# **Module 2: Writing 1 (10 credits)**

The students write two texts on themes of their own choice, one within a genre specified by the teacher and one within a genre of their own choice, which are discussed and developed in the module. The latter can be a development of a text they have started working with in a previous course. The students also comment on each other's texts.

#### **Module 3: Writing 2 (15 credits)**

In this module the students continue working with the text from module 2 for which they chose their own theme and genre. The text is discussed and revised several times. The students also write short texts in which they critically evaluate and reflect on their own and each other's texts.

#### Type of Instruction

The teaching is distance-based and delivered in the form of written assignments and discussions on an online learning platform and through online meetings. The students also critically and constructively comment on each other's texts, and self-critically reflect on their own texts. The students are also offered individual supervision in the various parts of the course, focusing on the students' own writing.

# Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

Module 1 is assessed with the grades Fail (U) or Pass (G). Modules 2 and 3 are assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG). In order to receive the grade of Pass, the student must achieve the objectives. Grading criteria for the grade of Pass with Distinction will be specified when the course starts. In order to receive the grade of Pass with Distinction on the course as a whole, the student must have received this grade for at least 15 credits.

Module 1 is examined through analytical written assignments and discussions about

literary texts and contexts, focusing on the form, content and theoretical and historical significance of the texts, as well as a continuous reading report in which the student's reading of literary texts is related to their own writing.

Modules 2 and 3 are examined through the literary texts the student writes, as well as contributions to discussion forums on the online learning platform on their own and the other students' writing.

Repeat examination is offered in accordance with Local regulations for courses and examination at the first and second-cycle level at Linnaeus University. If the university has decided that a student is entitled to special pedagogical support due to a disability, the examiner has the right to give a customised exam or to have the student conduct the exam in an alternative way.

# **Course Evaluation**

During the implementation of the course or in close conjunction with the course, a course evaluation is to be carried out. Results and analysis of the course evaluation are to be promptly presented as feedback to the students who have completed the course. Students who participate during the next course instance receive feedback at the start of the course. The course evaluation is to be carried out anonymously.
