Objectives

Section 1. The Swedish landscape: temporal and spatial perspectives 7.5 credits After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- describe the development and changes in a certain area of the Swedish rural landscape,
- discuss the interplay between humans and the environment from a long-term

- perspective,
- account for the urban architectural design in different time periods, discuss the interplay between urban development and changes in the surrounding rural landscape,
- exemplify and compare the development of the Swedish rural landscape with changes in rural landscapes in other parts of the world.

Section 2: From the Vikings to the warrior kings: the development of Sweden from the late 700s to 1721. 7.5 credits

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- in general terms account for the main features of Swedish history up to 1721,
- account for central historical developments, and take into consideration the role and changed status of religions,
- account for important minority peoples within the Swedish realm and their contributions to Swedish history up to 1721,
- exemplify and discuss similarities and differences between historical developments in Sweden and the history of some other country or culture.

Section 3: Modern Sweden: cultural, political, and religious developments from 1721 to today. 7.5 credits

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- in general terms account for the main features of Swedish history from 1721,
- discuss cultural, religious and social conditions in modern Sweden from a historical perspective,
- discuss how emigration and immigration contributed to forming modern Sweden,
- exemplify and discuss similarities and differences between the historical development of modern Sweden and that of some other country.

Section 4: Music and art in Sweden. 7.5 credits
After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- account for musical and visual means of expression in Sweden from historical and contemporary perspectives,
- identify and describe musical and visual means of expression from different time periods,
- relate musical and visual means of expression to contemporary cultural and societal contexts.
- exemplify and compare musical and visual means of expression in Sweden with the means of expression of another country or culture.

Content

Section 1. The Swedish landscape: temporal and spatial perspectives. 7.5 credits
This module discusses the rural landscape in Sweden from archaeological and
ethnogeographical perspectives, in particular as regards the development of prehistoric
and historical landscapes throughout time, as well as urban architecture and the
interplay between the city and changes in the surrounding rural landscape. The interplay
between humans, settlements and the environment is also discussed from
multidisciplinary and long-term perspectives.

Section 2. From the Vikings to the warrior kings: the development of Sweden from the late 700s to 1721. 7.5 credits

The module provides an overview of the main features of political, economic, social and religious developments in Sweden from the Viking Age to the death of Charles XII and the end of the era of the Swedish empire, around 1721. Swedish identity is problematised through discussions on indigenous peoples, the significance of migration, and the position of Skåne and Finland within the Swedish realm. A recurring theme throughout the module is religious change: from Norse and Sámi traditions to the establishment of the Catholic Church in Sweden, the Reformation, and a period of Lutheran dominance. Changes in gender relations are also highlighted. Throughout the module, comparisons and connections are made between Swedish history and the countries and cultures with which the students are familiar.

Section 3. Modern Sweden: cultural, political, and religious developments from 1721 to today. 7.5 credits

The module provides an overview of the main features of political, economic, religious and social developments in Sweden from 1721 to its emergence as a modern, pluralistic country in an increasingly globalised world. A recurring theme throughout the module is religious change, from a unified state church to a contemporary context characterised by both secularisation and religious diversity. Swedish identity is problematised through the study of ethnic and religious minorities in Sweden and the impact of migration on society. The module also addresses changing gender relations and the emergence of the welfare state. Throughout the module, comparisons and connections are made between Swedish history and the countries and cultures with which the students are familiar.

Section 4. Music and art in Sweden. 7.5 credits

This module starts with a general introduction to musical and visual means of expression in Sweden prior to 1720. After this, the module will focus on three time periods:

- the Age of Liberty and the Gustavian period
- · modernity and modernism
- the present times

All these will be studied from a combined approach to musical and visual means of expression in various social and cultural environments and institutions. The module will also discuss economic, technical, idea-historical and aesthetic changes. Throughout the module, comparisons and connections are made between musical and visual means of expression in Sweden and in other countries and cultures the students are familiar with.

Type of Instruction

Instruction is in the form of lectures, workshops, seminars and an excursion

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades A, B, C, D, E or F.

The grade A constitutes the highest grade on the scale and the remaining grades follow in descending order where the grade E is the lowest grade on the scale that will result in a pass. The grade F means that the student's performance is assessed as fail. Grade criteria for the A–F scale are communicated to the student through a special document. The student is to be informed about the grade criteria for the course by the start of the

course at the latest.

- active participation in seminars and an excursion.
