Prerequisites

General entry requirements.

Objectives

After completing the course, students shall be able to:

- use basic group psychological concepts and apply these in discussions on cases related to police operations
- account for the relations between the political governance of the police operations and its operations planning
- account for the police authority's need of cooperation with other authorities in the public sector.

Content

The course introduces the students to aspects of studying on the police education and the requirements and expectations that the police organisation has on new police officers.

This also entails that students acquire knowledge of basic group psychological theories and concepts, and are trained in applying these in base group work.

The implication of the police operations in Sweden ultimately being politically governed is established and defined. Here, students are given the opportunity to acquire general knowledge of the aims that the police strive to achieve. These aims are during the course clarified by studying legal documents and through discussions based on key policy documents.

Students are introduced to the construction and function of the judicial system, and judicial methods applied for problem solving on the basis of the principal sources of law are presented. Students are also provided with an overview of the different judicial areas and the international dimensions of law with emphasis on international law and human rights.

Aspects concerning the relation between law and political science are for instance

- judicial documents stating the aims of the police operations on one hand and key policy documents issued by political policymakers/representatives for the police authority on the other hand.
- the role of the police in a modern democracy (requirements on the exercise of power by the police being legally established, that it is executed taking into account needs and proportion, and is politically governed).

Type of Instruction

Teaching is mainly conducted by the use of problem-based methods. Knowledge acquisition in the elements takes place through individual work, base group work, supervision, seminars, lectures, literature studies and practical application. Students are expected to take an active part in discussions held during lectures and seminars. The working methods as well as the examination formats are intended to train the students' abilities to express themselves in an objective manner and adopt a critical approach, orally as well as in writing.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

Examination of the course component group psychology takes place by means of a group assignment carried out in base groups, with well developed texts followed by a public discussion and examination/feedback for a text developed by another base group. In order to receive a grade of Pass, it is required that the student attains the intended learning outcomes in the component.

Examination of the components law and political science takes place through a written examination. In order to receive a grade of Pass for the examination, it is required that the student attains the intended learning outcomes in the components law and political science. For a grade of Pass with Distinction for the examination, it is required that the student, on a high and advanced level and by the use of adequate theoretical evidence, has the ability to answer the questions included in the exam.

In order to receive a grade of Pass in the entire course, it is required that the student receives a grade of Pass for the group psychology exam as well as for the examination of the components law and political science. For a grade of Pass with Distinction in the entire course, the examination in group psychology must be assessed as Pass and the examination of the components law and political science must be assessed as Pass with Distinction.

Course Evaluation

A course evaluation is carried out either during or at the end of the course. Results and analysis are presented to the students who have completed the course as well as to the students at the following course date. The course evaluation is conducted anonymously. The results are reported to the programme council concerned and filed by the Institute of Police Education.
