Objectives

Police Conflict Management - Techniques and Methods

After completing the course, students shall be able to:

- describe the Police Authority's requirements in force with regard to carrying expandable batons and be able to use the expandable batons based on using as little force as possible
- fulfil police tasks after they themselves have been exposed to OC (pepper spray).
 The students shall also be able to conduct decontamination of another individual
- perform apprehension and transportation of a detained individual in a vehicle on the basis of the 6 basic principles for physical techniques and methods
- in motor exerices use techniques to defend themselves in situations involving threats of violence or violence in connection with crimes against human life or health

After completing the course, students shall be able to:

- describe the mental preparations in the short term as well as in the long term, and acute stress management
- · account for various coping strategies
- · apply methods for mental training

Radio communication/tactical liaison service

After completing the course, students shall be able to:

- explain the basic functions of the national police digital communications system,

- use adequate language during radio communication with regard to police contexts
- conduct fast and correct handling of the basic functions of hand-held as well as vehicle devices

Police Conflict Management - Firearms

After completing the course, students shall:

- know the basics of shooting with emphasis on taking the correct measures during shooting from various ranges
- be able to move around carrying the weapon both before, during and after firing, without failing to comply with regulations in force regarding handling of weapons
- · be able to remedy any malfunctions that may occur with the weapon
- be able to make tactical considerations in connection with having used the service weapon
- be able to account for the legal conditions that govern the use of firearms in connection with practical elements

Health

After completing the course, students shall be able to:

- account for and practice physical exercises such as flexibility, endurance, coordination, strength and speed
- based on tests performed, develop and analyse an individual training programme

Patrol Car Driving

After completing the course, students shall be able to:

- · account for and apply knowledge of the human factor in traffic
- stop vehicles in a tactical and road safe manner
- explain their own skills and any consequences of misjudgements during the component vehicle road positioning

Content

The course contains the subjects Health, Patrol Car Driving, Radio communication/tactical liaison, POLKON - police conflict management (here: police conflict management - techniques and methods, firearms, and basic tactics).

Police Conflict Management - Techniques and Methods

Students are trained in the use of technical aids, batons and OC. The course also provides knowledge of and practical skills in working methods used for work in

restricted environments such as custody and venicles. Students practice seif-defence techniques, how to identify accident risk factors related to the professional practice, and are also trained in intervention techniques for individual police officers and patrol officers.

Police Conflict Management - Basic Tactics

The component mental approach/mental training provides the students with advanced knowledge of the connection between stress, mind, feelings and actions. Knowledge is provided in how students through coping and stress management can handle their behaviour and reactions in situations that require stress management. The component also consists of models for mental training and relaxation methods. The mental knowledge area of police conflict management is also established.

Radio Communication/Tactical Liaison Service

The training is aimed at providing a national uniform working method for radio communication management. The course includes theory as well as practical application in radio communication rooms and outdoors. The subject is intregrated as a practical exercise in the module Criminal Investigation (1PX22U) and in the exercise Order and Security.

The course starts with a general presentation of how the RAKEL system network in Sweden is designed. Students shall learn adequate radio communication phrases and the international spelling alphabet. The different keys and functions on the hand-held communication device are also examined and the students practice the different kinds of calls that are made to the RLC (the regional command centre) and individual calls through the softkeys on the radio communication device.

Police Conflict Management - Firearms

Students are provided with advanced knowledge of laws obtained during previous courses with regard to the use of firearms in the police force. Behavioural science is also included to some extent, related to physical and mental reactions at fear and death anxiety, as well as mental preparations for the use of firearms during official duty. The students also practice communication during intervention situations. Students are provided with knowledge of reactivity related to the concept of time, i.e. the amount of time available in different police situations. Students are given the opportunity to in practice apply the knowledge of the shooting elements through brief visual displays on shooting targets. During shooting practice, techniques are introduced for shooting during interference and change of weapon, and ammunition impact.

Health

This subject is included in all five semesters. The overall aim of the subject Health is to provide knowledge and an understanding of the factors that have an impact on health in the professional role, with emphasis on the physical health. Students are also given the opportunity to develop their physical status and body awareness in order to be able to act in a safe, careful and skilful manner in their professional roles.

Key elements during the course are exercise science followed by an analysis of the students' own physical abilities related to different exercise qualities, previously conducted tests during the course Proficiency in patrol duty apsects of police work I, 1PX14U, and the demands on the profession. The students develop individually adapted training programmes based on these aspects.

Patrol Car Driving

The course contains theoretical instructions and supervised driving practice in stoppage

and driving on country roads. The element Stoppage introduces tactics and technical equipment installed in the vehicles. Focus is put on efficiency and setting an example in driving. This involves the placement of the vehicle on the road as well as regulating the speed, regulating gas/brake and steering wheel movements. Theoretical group work is performed prior to these elements.

Type of Instruction

Teaching is mainly conducted by the use of problem-based methods. Knowledge acquisition in the elements takes place through individual work, base group work, seminars, lectures and practical application. Practical elements are practiced through demonstrations, practical exercises, supervision and coaching.

The compulsory components are: Police Conflict Management -Techniques and Methods; training in baton use and OC regulated in FAP - the Police Authority's Regulations and General Advice. Police Conflict Management - Firearms; ammunition impact and simulator/laws, practical shooting test focused on the shooting target. Police Conflict Management - Basic Tactics; the exercise in mental imagery and seminars. Police Conflict Management - Patrol Car Driving; lecture and seminar on the component Risk Training.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

Police Conflict Management - Techniques and Methods

Examination takes place through a practical examination in physical techniques and methods, and two examinations in technical aids. Examination of the use of batons contains both practical skills as well as theoretical questions related to the working methods. Examination of OC takes place during an applied exercise. In order to receive a grade of Pass, it is required that the students during examinations demonstrate that the intended learning outcomes of the course are attained. For a grade of Pass with Distinction, it is required that the students during the practical examination of physical techniques and methods demonstrate special skills and consideration of strength in the elements.

Radio Communication/Tactical Liaison Service

Examination is carried out through a handling test during applied exercise, during which students are given theoretical questions related to tactical liaison. In order to receive a grade of Pass, students must demonstrate that the intended learning outcomes of the course are attained.

Police Conflict Management - Firearms

Examination of the subject Firearms takes place by means of a practical shooting test focused on the handling of weapons and the legislation in force for the use of firearms. For a grade of Pass, it is required that the students during the examination demonstrate that the intended learning outcomes of the course are attained.

Health

Examination of the subject Health is carried out through five practical sessions, one written presentation including an analysis of the individual training programme, and a written exam. In order to receive a grade of Pass, students must during all examinations demonstrate that the intended learning outcomes of the course are attained.

Patrol Car Driving

Examination takes place through two applied exercises, one oral examination and one written assignment in the form of a paper. For the grade of Pass, it is required that the students demonstrate that the intended learning outcomes of the course are attained.

In order to receive a grade of Pass with Distinction in the entire course, it is required that the students obtain the grade of Pass with Distinction for the examination in Police Conflict Management - Techniques and Methods, and the grade of Pass for all the other

examinations.

A retake of the examination is provided in accordance with the Local Regulations for First-Cycle and Second-Cycle Courses and Examination at Linnaeus University.

Should the university determine that a student has the right to special educational support due to impairment, the examiner may provide the student with an adapted test or the student may carry out the examination in an alternative way.

Course Evaluation

A course evaluation is carried out either during or at the end of the course. Results and analysis of the evaluation are presented to the students who have completed the course, as well as to the students at the following course date. The course evaluation is conducted anonymously.
