Objectives

Upon completion of the course, students should be able to:

- identify relevant legal issues
- account for legal methodology and various types of sources of law
- present different ways of interpreting and analysing legal documents
- search out legal source material at the library as well as in digital form, and correctly compile this material

- in a comprehensible manner present material in writing as well as orally
- carry out legal argumentation at a general level

Content

The aim of the course is to introduce the subject of legal methodology, mainly focusing on future work at government agencies and administrative authorities, companies, non-profit organisations, international organisations, or within the EU institutions. The students learn how to systematically find and refer to different sources of law, and one important part of this is having knowledge of the Swedish legislative process as well as knowledge of human rights and the sources of law within the EU. The course delves into legal information retrieval at libraries and on the Internet. The course provides library instructions about the library resources in the form of official publications, books, periodicals, and available public and legal databases.

On the basis of different legal issues, the students learn how to identify legal matters, look for relevant legal material and how to compile as well as analyse this. The course contains oral as well as written presentations of the prepared material and analysis. Through critical examination, the students also learn how to practice legal argumentation, in writing as well as orally. The methods of legal research are aimed at the current laws in force, but the students are also introduced to different ways of interpreting and analysing legal documents and sources within the scope of traditional legal dogmatics as well as within legal science in general. Through teaching in legal methods, the students are given the opportunity to gain an understanding of the legal basis and its application as well as information retrieval and investigative procedures. The ability to identify legal issues, analyse these and argue for legal choices is assessed through oral as well as written assignments.

Type of Instruction

Teaching takes place in the form of lectures, seminars and group assignments.

Possibilities for field trips and discussions with practicing lawyers are also provided.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

Examination of the course objectives takes place by means of three oral examinations carried out in groups, two individual written examination assignments, and one individual written exam.

In order to receive a grade of Pass in the course, the course objectives must be attained.

For a grade of Pass with Distinction in the course, it is required that the three written individual examination assignments are assessed as Pass with Distinction.

A retake of the examination is provided in accordance with the Local Regulations for First-cycle and Second-cycle Courses and Examination at Linnaeus University.

Should the university determine that a student is entitled to special educational support

due to impairment, the examiner may decide on adapted or alternative examination.

Course Evaluation

A course evaluation is carried out either during or at the end of the course. Results and analysis of the evaluation are presented to the students who have completed the course as well as to new students at the following course date, together with any improvements made.
