Objectives

On completion of the course, students should be able to:

- Find and analyse legal material within Swedish contract law and purchase law
- Explain and investigate the distribution of responsibility during damage.
- Identify legal problems and apply legal methods to solve legal problems

Content

The course begins with an overview of the importance of the contract for business. It continues with a run-through of the middleman legal problems that may occur, for example during proxy, commission as well as a little bit about rules in the case of bankruptcy. Furthermore, purchase law will be discussed from a commercial perspective. The course concludes by discussing tort law.

Type of Instruction

Teaching is in the form of lectures.

Group exercises may be included.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

The course as a whole is graded with one of the following grades: pass with credit, pass, fail as well as A-F according to ECTS grading scale. Grades are based on how well

students fulfil the expected learning outcomes. The course is examined through a written examination.

Students who do not achieve a satisfactory result in the examinations are permitted to make a second attempt approximately 5-8 weeks after the normal examination date. The student will have a minimum of five occasions for written exams in relation to the syllabus to which the student was accepted. Usually 3 occasions per academic year.

Course Evaluation

A written evaluation is conducted and compiled in a report, which is filed at the department. The result and actions, if taken, are communicated to the teacher responsible for the course and presented to the students in the way most appropriate according to the teacher responsible for the course. Other types of evaluations, such as continuous during the course or oral communication with the students, can occur and is encouraged to secure continuous quality improvement.
