Prerequisites

Objectives

After completing the course, the students should be able to:

- account for swear words, insults and taboo words from the perspective of Swedish language history,
- apply a sociocultural, contrastive and cognitive perspective on the semantics of these categories of words,
- in general terms account for swear words from neuro-linguistic and neurobehavioural perspectives,
- account for and explain the characteristic phonology of swear words and taboo words.

Content

This course introduces swear words, insults and taboo words from an interdisciplinary perspective. It uses Swedish literature, linguistics, history and psychology. The course includes a historical introduction to the development of swear words and insults in Swedish from the 17th century until today in relation to the cultural contexts of different time periods. The semantics of Swedish swear words and insults is discussed from a contrastive perspective, i.e. in relation to equivalents in other languages. The course also discusses language policies and cognitive aspects of swear words, insults and taboo words, as well as questions of verbal hygiene and how language influences thought and vice versa. The course also includes a general introduction to neuro-linguistic and neuro-behavioural findings regarding swear words, including their localisation in the brain, their physiological effects and their special role in aphasia. The prototypical phonology of swear words and taboo words is discussed, and phonology and function are related to each other.

Type of Instruction

This is an online distance course, using types of instruction appropriate for that form of distribution, such as recorded lectures and online seminars.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

In order to receive the grade of Pass, the student must achieve the objectives and be active continuously on the learning platform. Grading criteria for the grade of Pass with Distinction will be specified when the course starts.

The course is examined through compulsory group discussions, a minor empirical study of swear words, taboo words or insults, and a take-home examination.

For students who do not pass the first examinations, retake examinations are provided in accordance with local regulations at the university.

Course Evaluation

At the end of the course, a course evaluation is conducted. Results and analysis of the course evaluation are communicated to the students who have taken the course and the students who are taking the course when it is offered the next time.

The evaluation is anonymous. The course evaluation is filed according to departmental regulations.
