Prerequisites

General entry requirements for university studies.

Objectives

After completing the course, the students should be able to communicate using basic spoken and written German and thereby apply basic knowledge of German grammar.

Module 1. Language proficiency, 10 credits

After completing the module, the students should be able to:

- express themselves using basic written language to narrate, describe or inform others about a specific topic in German.
- participate in everyday conversations in German,
- read, understand and assimilate the content of simple instructions, stories and descriptions, and collect facts from simple prose texts.

Module 2. Written production, 10 credits

After completing the module, the students should be able to:

- apply basic knowledge of German grammar,
- express themselves comprehensively and coherently using basic written language to narrate, describe or inform others of known topics in German.

Module 3. Literature and culture, including oral production, 10 credits

After completing the module, the students should be able to:

- hold and participate in conversations in German on various topics related to the

- content of the course,
- read, understand and assimilate the content of stories and descriptions, and collect facts from prose texts.

Content

The course includes a number of different activities and texts meant to develop the students' language proficiency and knowledge necessary for university studies in German. All parts of the course are compulsory.

Module 1. Language proficiency, 10 credits

The module covers the basics of the four aspects reading, speaking, writing and listening in German, in subjects relevant to the students. The module includes, for example, reading texts, pronunciation practice, writing and listening exercises and basic conversations. The module focuses especially on basic grammar and developing the students' vocabulary.

Module 2. Written production, 10 credits

In this module the students practise written production. The module includes exercises in grammar, meant to develop the students' written language proficiency. The module focuses especially on the students' use of correct language and a varied vocabulary.

Module 3. Literature and culture, including oral production, 10 credits

In this module, the students read fiction and prose, and their oral language proficiency is practised in discussions of the texts. The students' oral communication is also practised through short presentations and discussions of other topics relevant to the students. In this module, the students have the opportunity to use and practise the language proficiency acquired in the other modules.

Type of Instruction

The course is delivered in cooperation between Linnaeus University and Internationella Skolorna (International Schools), at a language school in Berlin. The teaching is largely based on types of instruction meant to develop the students' language. The students are expected to participate in the teaching, but also to take great responsibility for their own language development and develop their own strategies for language learning. Teaching is mainly delivered in German in the form of seminars, group or pair projects, and individual studies.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

In order to receive the grade of Pass, the student must achieve the intended learning outcomes. Grading criteria for the grade of Pass with Distinction will be specified when the course starts.

Module 1. Language proficiency, 10 credits. The parts related to reading and writing are examined through a written test, the listening part is examined through a listening comprehension test, and the speaking part is examined through continuous examinations.

Module 2. Written production, 10 credits. The module is examined through a written test.

Module 3. Literature and culture, including oral production, 10 credits. The module is examined through oral presentations.

For students who do not pass the first examinations, retake examinations are provided in accordance with local regulations at the university.

Course Evaluation

At the end of the course, a course evaluation is conducted. Results and analysis of the course evaluation are communicated to the students who have taken the course and the
