

Prerequisites

French 1-60 credits.

Objectives

After completing the course, the student should be able to

- analyse fiction from French-speaking parts of the world
- demonstrate insight into literary theory in general and postcolonial theory in particular
- demonstrate knowledge about the culture and history of the former French colonies.

Content

This course is an introduction to modern fiction from the French-speaking parts of the world. Texts illustrating francophone literature in different French-speaking countries or regions are read and analysed from the point of view of different literature-theoretical questions. This literature is also discussed in relation to social and political processes.

Type of Instruction

Teaching is delivered in the form of lectures, seminars, exercises and supervision. Participation in seminars is compulsory.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

The course is examined through a short essay and an oral presentation.

If the university has decided that a student is entitled to special pedagogical support due to a disability, the examiner has the right to adapt the exam or to let the student conduct the exam in an alternative way.

Resit examination is offered in accordance with Local regulations for courses and examination at the first and second-cycle level at Linnaeus University.

Course Evaluation

During or shortly after the course, a course evaluation should be conducted. The result and analysis of the course evaluation should be promptly communicated to the students who have taken the course. Students who are taking the course when it is offered the next time should be informed of the result at the course introduction. The course evaluation is anonymous.
