#### **Prerequisites**

General entry requirements for studies at the second level and specific entry requirements:

90 credits in the main field of study, design (including an independent project of at least 15 credits) or the equivalent. English 6 or the equivalent.

#### **Objectives**

After completing the course, the student should be able to:

- understand, analyse, and reflect on place-based design
- practise design in collaboration with a local community based on its specific understandings and starting points

- initiate, implement, and materialise a complex design project together with a local community
- understand and reflect on ethical issues that arise during the course
- communicate the project work verbally, in writing, and visually, in a professional manner, from the point of view of a local and global context.

#### Content

The course starts out from different geographies based on the students' own local communities. Through lectures, seminars, and workshops, the student learns about and shares experiences of design that listens and learns in interaction with a place. Such places may be located in rural areas or be part of a city. The course focuses on design that originates from the specific understandings and agency of local cultures. During the course, designs are thus created based on a diversity of starting points and understandings. A central part of the course involves the student conducting a project in their own local community, which takes place in collaboration with other stakeholders. During the design project, the student focuses on exploring the place – its history, complexity, and possibilities. A key aspect of the course is the meticulous realisation of the project in relation to the relevant place.

## Type of Instruction

The teaching is delivered in the form of lectures, workshops, seminars, and supervision.

#### Examination

The course is assessed with the grades A, B, C, D, E or F.

The course is examined through an oral, written and visual presentation of a design project, including the design process, results, and reflections. Resit examination is offered in accordance with Linnaeus University's Local regulations for courses and examination at the first- and second-cycle levels. In the event that a student with a disability is entitled to special study support, the examiner will decide on adapted or alternative examination arrangements.

#### Course Evaluation

Course evaluation should be conducted during or shortly after the course. The results and analysis should be promptly communicated to those who have taken the course. Students participating in the next course instance should be informed of the results of the previous course evaluation and any improvements that have been made, no later than at the start of the course.
