### **Prerequisites**

English 1–90 credits including a degree project of at least 15 credits.

## Objectives

After completing the course, the student should be able to:

- demonstrate knowledge of corpus studies as a method in English linguistics, translation and teaching,
- account for the theoretical basis of English corpus linguistics,
- demonstrate knowledge of various corpus databases and corpus programmes, and the basics of practical collection of corpus data,
- apply various corpus-based methods in independent projects demonstrating independent and critical approaches,
- account for the principles of representativity and inferential statistics and conduct statistical analyses of linguistic data,
- demonstrate the ability to conduct basic data visualisation.

## Content

In this course the students develop in-depth knowledge of various corpus-linguistics methods, corpus software and theoretical aspects of the structure of the English language, as well as the factors predicting linguistic phenomena. The course includes an introduction to how information from language corpora can be applied in language studies, translation and teaching. The students learn statistical principles for corpus-based and corpus-driven analysis methods, and develop the ability to analyse quantitative research results by means of basic inferential methods.

The students learn how to apply various corpus-based methods by conducting their own minor studies on the basis of research articles.

### Type of Instruction

Teaching is delivered in the form of lectures and seminars. When the course is offered as a distance course, it is divided into thematic modules including reading, exercises and interactive online meetings.

### Examination

The course is assessed with the grades A, B, C, D, E, Fx or F.

In order to receive the grade of pass, the student must achieve the course objectives.

The grade of A is the highest grade and the grade of E is the lowest grade for passing the course. Grading criteria for the grades A–F will be specified when the course starts.

The course is examined through oral presentations and a written assignment.

For students who do not pass the first examinations, retake examinations are provided in accordance with local regulations at the university.

### Course Evaluation

At the end of the course, a course evaluation is conducted. Results and analysis of the course evaluation are communicated to the students who have taken the course and the students who are taking the course when it is offered the next time.

The evaluation is anonymous. The course evaluation is filed according to departmental regulations.
