### **Prerequisites**

English course B or the equivalent. 1–90 credit points in gender studies, history, political science, sociology or any other relevant subject, whereof 30 hp on the level G2E or equal.

## Expected learning outcomes

Students should acquire knowledge to be able to discuss, explain and analyze:

- different routes to welfare and democracy and consequences of the differences,
- construction of democracy from the perspective of gender, class, ethnicity and
- different organisations of social security systems in use after Second World War and consequences of the differences,
- the construction of citizenship from the perspective of gender, class, ethnicity and generation.

### Content

### Subcourse 1. Perspectives on welfare states and democracy,4 credits

Different routes to democracy and welfare during the twentieth and the twenty-first centuries are discussed and the connections between them are analysed. The outcomes in the Nordic countries are compared to the outcomes in other parts of the world.

### Subcourse 2. Perspectives on social security systems, 4 credits

A deeper analysis of welfare systems includes studying the organisation of social security systems. These are analysed from the perspective of gender, class, ethnicity

and generation.

### Subcourse 3. Perspectives on citizenship in the welfare state,7 credits

The concept of citizenship is analysed from the perspectives of gender, class, ethnicity and generation in order to obtain a holistic view of the development of welfare states. The ongoing globalisation is discussed from a citizenship perspective. The student writes a paper on an optional topic with relevance to the course.

### Type of Instruction

Discussions and correspondence via IT platform. All scheduled internet-seminars are compulsory.

### Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

A student who does not pass the examination on the first occasion is offered a maximum of four additional opportunities to sit the examination.

Students at Linnaeus University are entitled to have the course grade translated into the 7-step ECTS scale. A request to have the grades translated must be made to the teacher at the start of the course.

### Course Evaluation

A written course evaluation is performed and compiled into a report to be kept in the univer-sity school archives. The result and any measures taken are communicated to the course coor-dinator and presented to the students participating the next time the course is offered.
