# Type of Instruction

Workshops, lectures, seminars, discussion forums, student led tutoring. Language of instruction: English.

### Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

The course is examined individually through three written examinations (accounting for 3, 6 and 6 credits each). All written examinations are assessed with the grades U (Fail), G (Pass) or (VG) Pass with Distinction. For the total grade Pass, the grade Pass is required on all three examinations. For the total grade Pass with distinction, the grade Pass with distinction is required on at least two of the examinations, in combination with the grade Pass on the third examination.

Repeated examination is offered in accordance with Local regulations for courses and examination at the first and second cycle level at Linnaeus University.

If the university has decided that a student is entitled to special pedagogical support due to a disability, the examiner has the right to give a customised exam or to have the student conduct the exam in an alternative way.

### Course Evaluation

During the implementation of the course or in close conjunction with the course, a course evaluation is to be carried out. Results and analysis of the course evaluation are to be promptly presented as feedback to the students who have completed the course. Students who participate during the next course instance receive feedback at the start of the course. The course evaluation is to be carried out anonymously.
