On completion of the course, students, with a high degree of independence, should be able to:

- estimate the applicability and relevance of methods and theories within the field of religious studies;
- choose, cultivate and present information on central research within a specific empirical field;
- produce an academic religious studies text in the form of an essay;
- confidently make use of digital tools for the efficient retrieval of information.

Expected learning outcomes for module 1, *Literature of Current Interest in Religious Studies*, 10 credits

On completion of this module, students, with a high degree of independence, should be able to:

 identify current trends in international religious studies' theoretical and methodological discussions;

- critically evaluate a selection of methods and theories from the field of religious studies;
- apply, with certainty, a selection of methods and theories from the field of religious studies.

Expected learning outcome for module 2, *Specialised subjects II*, 5 credits
On completion of this module, students, with a high degree of independence, should be able to:

- with the help of modern information technology, identify international research from within a specific empirical field;
- independently, and with a clearly critical and analytical attitude, collect information within a defined empirical field;
- both verbally and in writing, and in an academic and reliable way, compile and present to others information within a defined empirical field.

Expected learning outcomes for module 3, Essay, 15 credits

On completion of this module, students, with a high degree of independence, should be able to:

- with intimate knowledge of earlier research, identify a religious studies problem;
- gather, evaluate and, from a religious studies perspective, cultivate data, as well
 as compiling and presenting the results in a text of such quality that it could be
 published in a religious studies context.
- independently, and with regard taken to existing research, evaluate another student's independent work according to the criteria for publishment in a religious studies context (peer-review)

Content

The course contains the following modules:

Module 1 Literature of current interest in religious studies 10 credits

This module contains a guide to current religious studies' debates and religious studies' controversies. The module focuses on a choice of knowledge of interest, theoretical considerations, methodological difficulties, stringent analysis and logical conclusions. This module also includes a historical background to the different dominating research traditions.

Module 2 Specialized subjects II 5 credits

During the course of this module, students will perform deeper studies in one of the following empirical fields:

- 1. Ancient religions
- 2. Judaism
- 3. Christianity
- 4. Islam
- 5. Hinduism
- 6. Buddhism
- 7. Eastern Asia's religions
- 8. Traditional religions in America, Africa and Oceania
- 9. New religious movements and the New Age Movement

Students are not allowed to choose the same empirical field that they chose in 2RK30E or GI1203.

Module 3 Nytt 15 credits

This module, in relation to earlier levels of progression, involves deeper training in critical

and analytical reading, in formulating a scientific problem and finding relevant literature within the subject field. The finished product should be a scientific, written, work. During seminars, students should constructively and critically discuss each others scientific texts. Students should be quite familiar with the research front within the subject of their essay. The objective of the course is for students to be able to produce a text that could be published in a scientific journal. This module also requires students to examine and oppose another student's text. The opposition will take the form of a simulated peer-review.

Type of Instruction

Teaching is in the form of lectures, seminars and group work, as well as supervision. The teacher will determine which components of the course are mandatory. Written and/or oral assignments are a part of the course.

Examination

The course is assessed with the grades Fail (U), Pass (G) or Pass with Distinction (VG).

In order to pass the course, students need to meet the expected learning outcomes. Examination occurs through written and oral exams, continuous assessments, oral presentations and handing in of written assignments. In order to receive the grade pass with distinction for the entire course, students need to have passed 20 credits with the grade pass with distinction.

Students who do not hand in assignments on time will fail the course.

A resit is offered within six weeks (within the framework of regular terms) and the number of resits is limited to five (in accordance with the Higher Education Ordinance 6 chap. 21§).

Course Evaluation

Course evaluation is carried out at the end of the course. The evaluation is compiled, reviewed with the students and archived according to departmental protocol.
